THE SUPREME EXAMPLE OF ENDURANCE: JESUS CHRIST 12:1-29

The Great Christian Race, 12:1-4

- 1. Its inspiration: A great cloud of witnesses (v.1a) 2. Its required disciplines (v.1b-c)
- a. To lay aside every weight and the sin that so easily trips us (v.1b)
- b. To run with endurance (v.1c)
- 3. Its supreme example: Jesus (v.2)
- a. His participation: The author and finisher (v.2a) b. His inspiration: The joy (v.2b)
- c. His discipline: Endured (v.2c) d. His reward: Exalted (v.2d)
- 4. Its controlling factor: Staying one's mind on Jesus' endurance (v.3)
- 5. Its great demand: Resisting temptation—even to blood (v.4)
- 1. The strong exhortation concerning discipline (v.5-7)
- a. Do not take discipline lightly (v.5a) b. Do not faint or give up under discipline (v.5b)
- c. Endure discipline (v.6-7) 1) God disciplines us because He loves us (v.6)
- 2) God disciplines us because we are His children (v.7)
- 2. The purposes of discipline (v.8-11)
- a. To show us that we are sons of God (v.8) b. To teach us to think of life now and eternally (v.9) c. To make us a sharer of God's holiness (v.10)
- d. To bear within us the fruit of peace and righteousness (v.11)
- 3. The believer's duty (v.12-13)
- a. To strengthen his weak grip and buckling knees (v.12) b. To make straight paths for his feet (v.13a) c. To receive healing, that is, discipline (v.13b)

The Great Duty and The Great Dangers of Believers, 12:14-17

- 1. The great duty of believers (v.14)
- a. To pursue peace (v.14a) b. To pursue holiness (v.14b)
- 2. The great dangers threatening believers (v.15-17)
- a. The danger of falling short of God's grace (v.15a) b. The danger of bitterness (v.15b)
- c. The danger of immorality (v.16) d. The danger of being sensual and profane... Esau (v.17)

The Great Motivation: The Two Approaches to God—The Old and the New Covenants,

- 1. The first or old approach: The old covenant (v.18-21)
- a. Was an external worship (v.18a) b. Was to a holy, distant God of judgment (v.18b)
- c. Was a reluctant, fearful approach (v.19-21) 1) To the people (v.19-20) 2) To the leaders 21)
- 2. The new approach: The new covenant (v.22-24)
- a. Is a spiritual and heavenly worship (v.22a) b. Is to the angels of God (v.22b)
- c. Is to the church of Christ (v.23a) d. Is to God, the Judge of all (v.23b)
- e. Is to the spirits of the righteous already departed (v.23c)
- f. Is to Jesus, the Mediator—to the sprinkled blood of Jesus (v.24)

Warning Five: The Danger of Refusing to Hear Jesus Christ—12:25-29

- 1. There shall be no escape whatsoever for the close-minded (v.25)
- a. There was no escape under Moses and the law (v.25a)
- b. Much more, there will be no escape under Christ and grace (v.25b)
- 2. God warns about a great shaking and judgment of heaven and earth in the future
- a. To remove and change the material elements (v.27a) b. To prove eternal elements (v.27b)
- 3. Think: An unshakeable kingdom can be received (v.28-29)
- a. How: By showing gratitude, that is, by serving God (v.28) b. God is a consuming fire (v.29)

HEBREWS CHAPTER 13 OUTLINE

THE SUPREME MARKS OF CHRISTIAN CONDUCT, 13:1-25

Mark One: Controlling One's Personal Behavior, 13:1-8

- 1. Mark 1: Brotherly love (v.1) 2. Mark 2: Hospitality (v.2) 3. Mark 3: Helping the prisoners and the mistreated (v.3) 4. Mark 4: Purity in marriage (v.4)
- 5. Mark 5: Contentment (v.5-6)
- a. By being free of covetousness (v.5a) b. By having God's continued presence and help (v.5b) c. By your testimony (v.6)
- 6. Mark 6: Remembering your leaders (v.7)
- a. Those faithful to the Word (v.7a) b. Follow their faith (v.7b)
- c. Their end: They shall be with God (v.7c)
- 7. Mark 7: Remembering your Source of life and power—Jesus Christ (v.8)

Mark Two: Guarding Against Strange Teaching, 13:9-16

- 1. The strange doctrines or teachings (v.9-11)
- a. Strange teachings carry people away from God's grace (v.9a) b. Strange teachings stress ritual over grace (v.9b) c. Strange teachings do not profit a person (v.9c)
- d. Strange teachings are based upon the wrong sacrifice (v.10-11)
- 2. The true doctrine or teaching (v.12) 3. The duty of believers (v.13-16)
- a. Must go forth to Christ (v.13)b. Must seek the continuing, eternal city (v.14)
- c. Must offer the sacrifice of praise to God continually (v.15)
- d. Must do good and give sacrificially (v.16)

Mark Three: Obeying and Praying for Leaders and Being Perfected In Good Works,

- 1. Mark 1: Obeying leaders (v.17)
- a. Leaders watch over our souls (v.17a) b. Leaders know their accountability (v.17b)
- c. Leaders can be grieved and hurt (v.17c)
- **2.** Mark 2: Praying for one another (v.18-19) 3. Mark 3: Being perfected by God and Christ (v.20-21) a. By the God of peace (v.20a) b. By the God of resurrection and life (v.20b)
- c. By the great Shepherd (v.20c) d. By the everlasting covenant (v.20d) e. By the working and energizing of God (v.21)
- **4.** The concluding remarks (v.22-25) a. Be open to exhortation (v.22) b. Be aware of the conditions of saints (v.23) c. Be in fellowship with leaders (v.24) d. Be aware of God's grace (v.25)
